Recreational Therapist

Recreational therapists plan, direct, and coordinate recreation-based medical treatment programs to help maintain or improve patients' physical, social, and emotional well-being. Activities could include arts and crafts, animals, sports, games, dance and movement, drama, music, and community outings. Recreational therapists treat and help maintain the physical, mental, and emotional well-being of their clients by seeking to reduce depression, stress, and anxiety; recover basic motor functioning and reasoning abilities; build confidence; and socialize effectively. Recreational therapists work in a variety of settings, including hospitals, nursing homes, schools, government parks, and recreation departments.

How Do I Become a Recreational Therapist?

PROJECTED JOB **GROWTH RATE IS** 4% BY 2033

To become a recreational therapist, you typically need to earn a bachelor's degree in therapeutic recreation or recreation and fitness from an accredited program and gain relevant experience. Employers, and some states may require or prefer therapists to be certified. The National Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification (NCTRC) offers the Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist (CTRS) credential.

What Does a Recreational Therapist Do?



Assess patients' needs through observation, medical records, tests, and discussions with other healthcare workers and patients and their families.



Help patients learn social skills needed to become or remain independent.



Develop and implement treatment plans that meet patients' goals and interests.



Help patients to reduce and cope with stress, anxiety, or depression.



Engage patients in therapeutic activities, such as exercise, games, and community outings.



Document and analyze a patient's progress to ensure that their goals are met and to modify treatment as needed.
