Licensed Mental Health Counselor

Licensed Mental Health Counselors (LMHC's) help individuals, groups or families cope with mental, emotional, and behavioral challenges by developing treatment plans, facilitating therapy, and providing support for issues like addiction, depression, anxiety and relationship problems. Some work with specific populations, such as children or older adults. LMHC's can specialize in addiction counseling, career counseling, clinical mental health counseling, clinical rehabilitation counseling, marriage and couple counseling, trauma counseling, child and family counseling and grief counseling. LMHC's may work in community mental health clinics, hospitals, private practice, schools, universities, government agencies, non-profit organizations, inpatient and outpatient treatment centers and correctional facilities.

How Do I Become a Licensed Mental Health Counselor?

PROJECTED JOB GROWTH RATE IS 19% BY 2034 To become a LMHC a master's degree with at least 600 internship hours is required or a doctoral degree in counseling by a school that is accredited. Common fields of undergraduate study include psychology, public policy and social services, and social science. After completing the degree, you'll need to complete supervised clinical experience, typically under the guidance of a licensed professional. In New York, 3,000 hours are needed. In addition, some counselors must be licensed. To become licensed take a national licensing exam such as the National Clinical Mental Health Counselor Examination (NCMHCE), or the National Counselor Examination (NCE) which are offered by the National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC) and then apply to your state's licensing board.

What Does a Licensed Mental Health Counselor Do?

- ✓ Patient interaction, encouraging patients to communicate experiences and feelings.
- Conduct assessments and evaluations.
- ✓ Develop and implement treatment plans.
- Work with patients to define life goals, plan for the future and help develop coping skills.

- Document and maintain records of clients' progress & perform administrative work.
- Crisis Intervention
- Provide support and refer clients to other resources, services, professionals and support groups.
- Prepare clients for transition out of counseling through discharge planning.

"The most challenging aspect of my job is working with people who are not able to see the changes they need to make and figuring out how to help them realize their thoughts, feelings, or behavior are negatively affecting themselves and those around them. Sometimes I need to accept that they aren't ready yet and wait and sometimes I need to be creative in my approach. Knowing which is difficult because sharing something about a person they don't see, can't see, or don't want to see can be mean if not done carefully and kindly." -Ken Tangel

What do you wish you knew back in school that you know now?

"I wish i had known that when they told us in school that we are not in this field to make money that they were telling the truth!" -Tammy Kling

"I wish I knew how little school would prepare me for the issues I would actually be dealing with and the approaches I would actually use most." **-Ken Tangel**
